

Recently, we have found ourselves almost suddenly starting up our familiar fall seasonal routine—swapping out dresser drawers, stowing summer clothes, revamping the landscaping with mums and kale; and the list goes on and on... Now we have stepped it up because the little cold stretch last week was a wake-up call that we can't stay in denial about winter forever! All this re-doing, re-organizing, re-forming that we do in mid-fall is so that we can survive the coming season and then re-emerge, protected and refreshed, in the spring.

Even the groundhogs in the yard are preparing. Huddled together in their deep dens, they are beginning to hibernate so they can escape the conditions that would otherwise kill them. Have you ever wished you could hibernate, too? Or at the very least, escape all this by heading South until the cold of Lent gives way to the warmth of Easter? Unfortunately, for many of us, neither hibernation nor retreat are viable options. On the other hand, nor do they need to be! Unlike groundhogs, we do not have to escape the months to come. We can be ready:

to withstand, to endure; and even perhaps to enjoy the cold winter season!

aith has its winters, too. Discipleship is not simply summer; things get difficult, especially when we respond in earnest to the challenges Christ gives us in his great commandment and commission. There will be times when we might really want to retreat, or hibernate until our problems go away. However: loving ourselves, each other, and the world the way Christ loves us, requires neither retreat nor hibernation. Scriptures are filled with moments (even seasons!) during which people *wished* they could escape, but instead learned to endure, and eventually emerge amazingly refreshed, rejuvenated, ...and reformed.

Our founding priest, Martin Luther, did not want to hibernate from the winter of his faith, either. Luther wanted to reform himself, and his spirit and his heart. He wanted to emerge from his own faithful struggle as a stronger, better priest and person. He also wanted the church of his day to repack its dresser, to swap out some of its paradigms, to reconsider the theology it was wearing and to reemerge as a springtime church refreshed, rejuvenated, ...and reformed.

It was a long winter, indeed, for Luther!

Keforming *ourselves* remains one of the central goals of the Lutheran life. But how, exactly, are we to winterize our faith in the face of a cold and demanding world? Well, first of all, we have the story: the living Scriptures and the stories told within the church year always help to keep us on the path that is illuminated by Christ, even on the darkest days. Second, we have the saints who, having gone before us, bravely cleared the paths on which we step every day. Remembering their examples—not just on All Saints' Day, but every day—gives us strength.

ore than that, though, we have the Holy Spirit. We have our baptismal cloak. We have the clothes of righteousness to put on, and the spiritual armor that only God can give us. So this fall, reform yourself: repack your spiritual dresser with attire from the armoire of God, and discover that you, too, can weather anything!

THE ST. JOHN'S FOOD PANTRY

There are many places in the world where food insecurity is a daily reality for many. Poughkeepsie is not immune from the pressures that people feel when they cannot afford food for themselves and their families. That's where food pantries can help, and our Social Ministry Mission Team has grown the St. John's Food Pantry into a thriving enterprise that helps those in need.

On the first, third, and fifth Sundays of each month, members of the Social Ministry Mission Team can be found very early in the morning here at St. John's setting up the Food Pantry. Often arriving even before the 8:00 AM arrival of the Contemporary Service Music Ministry for rehearsal, they busily set up shelving and tables and sort food for distribution. Diane Rosengren is frequently one of those hurriedly preparing for the 9:00 AM opening of the pantry.

"We have a great team of workers who have helped so much. People help by setting up, buying food, and packing the bags from our closet each time we're open. Abby and John Dux have made a tremendous improvement with the wonderful rolling carts." Among others Diane cited for their incredible help with the food pantry were Jan Viola, Lucinda Kaiser, and Brenda and Bella Swatek. "The church office has also been there to help us with



many things. I would like to also acknowledge the members who donate the food and those who make the monetary donations that help with the restocking costs. Someone is watching over us!"

Many thanks to the hard-working members of the St. John's Social Ministry Mission team for the love and dedication they put into the Food Pantry. They help so many in our community who are in need. St. John's and Poughkeepsie are truly blessed to have the opportunity and the support to be able to aid others.

Mark Jacobson has been our missionary since 2013. He has been diagnosed with a brain tumor. We know the power of daily prayer by many. So, please we ask each of you, our members, to include him daily as you pray. Mark and his wife spent their lives working at Ashura Lutheran Medical Center in Tanzania. They cared for the people of the region, educated medical personnel, and shared their faith through their work in Tanzania. As modern missionaries in the ELCA, they worked in partnership with Tanzanians. He was born in Stillwater, Minnesota and met his wife, Linda, at graduate school at Johns Hopkins University. He was the Executive Director of the Ashura Lutheran Medical Center. Plaster House, part of their medical work at Ashura, enables children to have corrective orthopedic surgery, plastic surgery, or neurosurgery. After 38 years of mission service, they retired this year.
