But it hasn't always been that simple. It's easy to forget that there has always been debate about the nature of Jesus, such as whether he was really resurrected, or whether he and God were of the same substance. While it may seem as though the people who lived at the time of the resurrection would have a clearer vision about it, that was not necessarily true.

Illustrative is the account of Mary Magdalene having had an audience with Tiberius shortly after Jesus' ascension into heaven. With an egg in her hand as object lesson, Mary explained to the Emperor the story of the resurrection. Tiberius was unmoved, replying that Christ was no more resurrected than the egg in Mary's hand was red. In that instant, the egg miraculously turned quite red—and Tiberius was convinced!

Scholars of the day remarked about that interaction and the resulting legislation that Tiberius sought in order to officially deify Christ. For instance: Eusebius, a Christian scholar and historian (260-339 A.D.) wrote: "They say that Tiberius referred the matter to the Senate, but that they rejected it, ostensibly because they had not first examined into the matter, for an ancient law prevailed that no one should be made a god by the Romans except by a vote and decree of the Senate..." Also, Tertullian (155-220 A.D.) noted that "...there was an old decree that no god should be consecrated by a general without the approval of the Senate....among you (Romans) divinity is weighed out by human caprice. Unless a god shall have been acceptable to men, he shall not be a god."

pistemological problems aside, it is fascinating that people always have, and probably always will, only believe what they want to believe—or, more specifically, what they can comprehend. In a strange way, it's helpful that the Roman lawmakers refused to allow Jesus to be given the title of "God"—at least we know that humanity's propensity toward a lack of faith in the mystery of our Lord is not a *new* thing.

ext week, as we celebrate the Ascension for the almost 1,989th time, consider the obvious folly of the Romans way back then, and then reflect a bit—where are you, on the spectrum of mystery? Are you content with leaving certain things in God's hands? ...leaving *everything* in God's hands? As you enter into this beautiful time of Spring and Summer, take a quiet moment in the warm sunshine to rejoice in the fact that Jesus *knew* we wouldn't ever totally understand what he did—and that is precisely why he did it! And: take rest in the fact that we literally don't have to know it all, or control it all. God <u>has</u> it all—in the palm of one hand. Hey: Feel that sun on your face?

That's God at work, too!




Happy Spring!

A messy living room means Worship Matters...

My husband, Steve, came into our living room and could hardly find a place to walk as there were papers on nearly every flat surface. "She's at it again," he thought as he maneuvered his way through the piles to the couch. This scene was quite familiar, as every month I get out bins of music and I think, I sort and I hum my way through selecting music for the contemporary worship services in the upcoming month. I can spend hours scouring those bins as well as hunting on the CCLI site (where I get new music), in search of ideal songs that represent the theme and readings for each Sunday. I am quite sure that Patrick (St. John's music director & organist for the 10:30



am worship service) spends his fair share of time on that music as well, (although I bet his living room isn't as disastrous as mine!) Why do we do that? **Because worship** matters.

Altar Guild ("Worship Prep Team" as I call it) works hard to be sure all is ready for communion and that the ambiance of worship: banners, flowers and candles, have all been attended to in a way that shows honor and reverence to God. Why do they do that? **Because worship matters.**

The office staff spends about 50% or more of the time during the week, creating, editing, proofing, revising and printing the bulletin we use for worship. Why do we do all that? **Because worship matters.**

Volunteers start the carillon (bells), so they ring just prior to the start of the service, inviting people to join the congregation in worship. The ushers turn up the lights at the beginning of the service to draw focus to the altar/ cross and then turn them down again as a signal to exit worship with renewed faith, ready to share God's love. I could go on with examples of behind the scenes work that is done to assure that the worship experience at St. John's is meaningful and honoring. However, perfection is never the goal nor is worship viewed as some sort of show we put on each week. Worship is a unique connection with God and when we worship in community, it is a connection with one another; a unifying activity as we corporately worship as ONE. The leadership at St. John's puts a high priority on worship and puts much effort into its creation because worship matters.

Certainly, acts of Christian service, disciplines such as Bible study & prayer as well as care and concern for others, are ways we live out the beliefs we profess, and help us express our faith in tangible ways. Such responses are worthy of our time and pleasing to God. However, it is even more important to simply sit in the presence of God:



worshiping, expressing our heartfelt devotion and praising to the Lord. This article would be extremely lengthy (and I would get in trouble for being too wordy... as I often am), if I gave examples of ways we can worship God. Yet for the sake of brevity (oh boy, have I passed that point already?) I will emphasize that there is nothing like being with Christian brothers and sisters, sitting side by side and worshiping in one accord at church.

Therefore St. John's spends much time and energy preparing for worship...not to be perfect, but to be authentic and honoring.

If you feel you are <u>not</u> compromising your health by attending in-person worship but have gotten out of the habit of coming to worship in community at the church, I encourage you to make a goal of coming each Sunday for a month. Make the time to worship and ask God to sort out how you will still get done the things you need to do. I have confidence that God will work in your situation to give you enough time for the other things in your life that cry for your time and attention outside of worship time. At the end of the month, ask yourself:

Have I felt more connected to God?

Has time spent in worship renewed me spiritually?

Where do I go from here? What does God want from me in terms of worship?

You can answer those questions yourself and proceed as the Spirit leads you and your family. But rest assured, St. John's will always be here: planning and implementing opportunities for worship together in community. Altar Guild scheduling snafus, difficulty creating bulletins and a living room covered with sheet music are all worth it...because worship matters to us, and I believe with all my heart...worship matters to God too.




Food Pantry Update

Jacobson, Dr. Mark L. 70, died on February 11, 2022,

surrounded by his family. A man of great faith, he was called to serve as a physician in Arusha, Tanzania, his home for almost 40 years. Mark was born Dec 16, 1951, in Stillwater, MN, to Reuben and C. Jean Jacobson. He married his wife Linda in 1982, his partner in life and work, and they raised their three daughters in Arusha. Mark was a man of vision and action. Through The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, he developed and directed health projects in Tanzania and other countries. He grew a one-room clinic into two nationally recognized hospitals, and as health needs in the area changed, he developed programs around HIV/AIDS, obstetric fistula repair, palliative care and hospice, cancer care, and medical training. Equipped with degrees from Harvard College, the University of Minnesota Medical School (where he was also a Professor), and Johns Hopkins University, Mark helped build local health institutions that will remain in the care and leadership of Tanzanians. Mark loved safari drives. music, travel, squash, and bird watching. He kept a sense of humor to the end: of his brain tumor he joked "I'm sick, but it's all in my head". He is survived by his loving wife Linda; his three daughters and their spouses, Laura (James Wu), Sarah (Stéphane Dérobert), and Katherine; and his three sisters and their spouses, Lynn and Rich Voelbel, Jeanie Morrison, Kris Jacobson and Bill Chadwick, and many nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by Bob Morrison. Memorials welcome to groups dear to Mark: Operation Bootstrap Africa (Mark and Linda Jacobson Endowed Scholarship); Global Health Ministries (Selian Hospice); or Foundation for Cancer Care in Tanzania (Brain Cancer Initiative).
